### Introduction

Before the discussion can unfold, we need to consider briefly the concept of violence itself. The most common notion is that violence entails the use of physical force, usually with the purpose of injuring or damaging the object of the violence. The tools of such violence can range from flying fists and feet to clubs and bullets to nerve gas to nuclear missiles. But notice that some analysts take a much broader view of violence. First, the threat of violence might sometimes be understood as a form of violence, even if the violence act is not actually committed. Even broad review of violence includes various forms of subjugation and manipulation that do not involve physical harm. For example, consider a group that is underclass within a society. The group is subjected to discrimination in education, in health care, in jobs, in housing. This international pattern of systematic deprivation continues over time. The group is not targeted for any specific physical violence, but the economic and cultural system provides the group with minimal opportunities to gain a significant share of the values in the society .....
